India plans remote ATC towers for regional airports

Searidge, which has set up remote digital towers in Hungary, Albania and Azerbaijan, said it has also presented its technology to the airport regulator.

INDIA IS CONSIDERING setting up remote air traffic control (ATC) towers to cut costs and overcome labour shortages, government sources told Reuters, as Prime Minister Narendra Modi looks to open doors of regional airports to boost air travel.

Remote monitoring allows traditional concrete control towers to be replaced with dozens of high resolution, infra-red cameras around runways that feed live images to screens in buildings far from the airport.

The Airports Authority of India (AAI) has initiated a study on remote monitoring of flights, with a recommendation expected in September, one of the sources said. A decision to proceed could be a boost to companies like Sweden's Saab and Canada-based Searidge Technologies that are in talks with the airport regulator to bring the technology to India. "India is one of the biggest opportunities in terms of the business potential," said Varun Singh, marketing director at Saab India, adding that it has held several discussions with the airport regulator.

towers are in use, one source said. The plan hinges on DGCA's approval because remote tower technology is not standardised by the International Civil Aviation Organisation, which is still drawing up regulations. In the meantime, countries follow their own safety guidelines.

"Remote ATC is all the more needed for India given our vast area, low traffic at regional airports and the need to keep airfares low," said Amber Dubey, India head of aerospace and defence at consultancy KPMG.

While there have been power failures at ATC towers at two of India's biggest and busiest airports — Delhi and Mumbai — in the past, no incidents or accidents occurred as a result, according to local media reports.

The bigger concern, however, is the transfer of data from the airport to the remote tower. An ATC official at India's airport regulator said they are yet to understand how the data transfer will work, what medium will be used and what the backup will be.

"If the (data transfer) medium goes blank, the airport will be cut off," said the official, who did not wish to be named as he was not authorised to speak to the media.

Cartel cases: Individuals can seek leniency from CCI

INDIVIDUALS SUSPECTED TO be involved in cartelisation cases can now seek leniency, including complete waiver of penalty, by making required disclosures before the Competition Commission of India (CCI) norms, an applicant is eligible to get the penalty reduced up to 100% in cartelisation cases if the entity makes a vital disclosure by submitting evidence of a cartel.

The watchdog has powers to penalise entities indulging in unfair business practices.

Now, individuals who are involved in a cartel can approach the regulator for leniency. Earlier, the leniency option was there for an enterprise but it was not clear whether that also extended to individuals.

In this regard, the watchdog has made changes to the Competition Commission of India

(Lesser Penalty) Amendment Regulations.

About this amendment, law firm Chandhiok & Associates said the intention appears to be to develop a regime which encourages individuals to come forward and report such conduct.

As per the act, individuals can be penalised for anti-competitive practices.

In another significant change, applicants seeking leniency have to provide details of the volume of business affected in India by the alleged cartelisation.

"This is perhaps a subtle indication of the CCI's enforcement priority to concentrate on cartels which have a direct and substantial effect in the Indian market," the law firm said.

Among others, the latest amendments provide discre-

tionary power to the CCI with respect to confidentiality.

If the director general feels it is necessary to disclose the information provided by the applicant, subject to certain conditions, the same can be done even if the applicant does not give a confidentiality waiver in that regard.

The DG — the investigation arm of the regulator — can disclose such information to another party provided it is approved by the CCI.

According to Chandhiok & Associates, the amendments are demonstrative of the CCI's practical experience in dealing with leniency cases.

"The amendments provide much needed clarity on issues such as status of individuals, benefit of reduction to more than one applicant...", it added.

Acharya outlines pitfalls of debt-driven 'furious growth'

AMIDST SHRILL CALLS for double-digit growth, Reserve Bank deputy governor Viral Acharya has warned that such faster GDP expansion is always at some point with disastrous consequences.

He said the focus, instead, now must be to structurally set the economy on the right direction so that when it gets its mojo back growth can pick up at a more sustainable pace that will be more sustainable.

"I think, invariably, the episodes of 9 to 10% growth are all laden with massive debt-

based funding of some asset class," Acharya told an Asia Society event last night.

Expressing his apprehensions over such a state of the economy, he said, "I get scared when an economy grows at 9 to 10% because it is not that easy to generate sustainable growth of 9 to 10%. You got to have generated tremendous improvement in your productivity in a short period to be able to deliver that kind of growth."

But unfortunately such an economy will come crashing down and "we have already witnessed

such crashes right here as well as elsewhere in the past," he said.

With focus on financial control and other measures to correct the balance sheets of companies and banks, "the RBI in its own way is paving the way for more sustainable growth for over next three to five year horizon down the road," he said.

"It would be a mistake if we do not repair our balance sheets in a quick and an efficient manner now so that we can start growing fast in a sustainable way," Acharya said.

Take speedy decisions: PM to bureaucracy

PRIME MINISTER NARENDRA Modi has asked all wings of the government to work in a synchronised manner and speed the bureaucracy to take speedy decisions, promising that 'honest decision-making with good intention would always be encouraged.'

Good governance should be a priority for the officers, he said during an interaction with a group of over 70 additional secretaries and joint secretaries in the central government, according to a PMO statement.

Modi asked the officers to focus attention on the 100 most backward districts of India, so that they can be brought up to the national average level, on various development parameters.

The prime minister said the combination of development and good governance is essential for the welfare and satisfaction of citizens, the statement said about the last interaction.

He emphasised the need for all wings of the government to work in harmony and synchronisation to achieve the best possible results, it added.

Underlining the importance of breaking silos, he pressed for efficient internal communication between various departments of the government.

Modi said all officers must keep the poor and the ordinary citizens in their minds while taking decisions, the PMO said.

The prime minister said this was a unique opportunity for the officers to deliver their utmost for the benefit of the nation.
